Registrations Fees

Bill Reed is an internationally recognized proponent and practitioner in sustainability and regeneration. He is a principal in three firms, Integrative Design Collaborative, Regenesys, Inc., and Delving Deeper – green building consulting, living system design, and education organizations working to lift building and community planning into full integration and co-evolution with living systems. His work centers on creating the framework for and managing an integrative, whole-systems design process.
